Act I/First Half:



Eight reasons why you'll go flat

- Shallow Breaths (collar breathers and shoulder heavers). The music will sag at the end of each phrase or in the middle. Breathe from the gut.
- Low Breath Supply. The usual cause is failure to breathe properly, particularly when there are long holds or retarded phrase endings.
- Wrong Intervals. In ascending passages, the steps taken are too small. In descending passages, the steps are too large, resulting in overshooting.
- Relaxing Support. Soft passages are no excuse for failing to keep the diaphragm firm.
- Parts Not Learned. Leaners and crows that are a split second behind and not anticipating pitch.
- Scooping. Do not attack the note from below. You won't make it.
- Large Drop in the Interval. Overshooting frequently occurs. Also, major thirds should be sung on the high side.
- Not Listening. Seek a unit section sound and all sections should tune to the melody.

Twelve step learning program

This was originally presented to us by Stella Kelly, our previous Musical Director.

This is a 12-step program to assist you in learning your music. It is only a suggestion until you learn the system that works best for you.

The success of this program is contingent upon the effective listening skills of the learner ... much more than upon the musical background or ability to read music.

Any of the 12 steps may be repeated before continuing on to the next step. But, remember EACH step is important to the overall successful results of learning ALL the right notes, words and timing of the new song.

DO NOT eliminate any of the steps because they may appear to be insignificant to you.

Here we go

- Listen to the music on the tape while you close your eyes. This will familiarize you with the notes, timing and general flavour of the song.
- Watch the **notes** on your music while you listen to the tape. DO NOT SING YET!
- 3. Repeat number two. DO NOT SING YET!
- 4. Watch the **words** on your music while you listen to the tape. Please, no singing yet!
- On a separate piece of paper write down all the lyrics to the new song. Now watch your paper while you listen to the tape. Still no singing.

- 6. Watch the notes again while you are listening to the tape.
 Remember, no singing yet!
- 7. Watch the words on your music while you listen to the tape. Be careful not a sound!
- 8. Try to write down all the words again on a separate piece of paper without looking at your printed music. If you have trouble, listen to the tape again. Watch the words and then try writing it again without looking. Stay on this step until you have all the right words without looking back at the music or listening to the tape.
- Hurray! Finally you can add YOUR voice! Now watch the notes on your music while you hum along with the tape. Singing is next.
- 10. Watch the words on your music while you sing along with the tape. Can you believe this? You are actually going to sing this song for the first time!
 - However, if you have any difficulty, circle the spot on your music as you go all the way through. Then go back and listen (don't sing) to those parts again. Happy singing!
- 11. Put a practice tape of your own in the recorder. Now, on your own tape, SING the new part all the way through without looking at your music. Bet you could hardly wait to hear this step!
- 12. Very important step .. you are about to graduate! Watch your music and listen to your own tape and see if you are correct. Concentrate on listening to the parts you had circled earlier to make sure you are correct.
