

A Rookies Class

Larry Driessens, Blake Hughes and I attended the Music & Performance class at COTS. Don Pyper, the Immediate Past President of the District was cur class instructor.

Our class, of 35 men, touched on many facets of running a chapter. Some of the ideas and methods discussed were as follows:

- ♪ Some chapters meet for two and a half hours and divides that time into 20 minute blocks for each portion of the meeting.
- Many chapters have the membership broken down into monthly teams which set up the risers, arrange the chairs and distribute information during their month.
- ♪ Chapters had several different ways of starting their meetings. Some have three 'rusty' notes blown on a pitchpipe; others have a seargent-at-arms who announces the beginning of a meeting; still others bang a gavel to begin.
- Many chapter have difficulties with members' discipline when on the risers (Editor's Note: a dilemma we in Strathroy have not yet experienced, and keep it that way). In many cases the Seargent-at-arms was able to control the discipline problems.
- ♪ Some chapters have their members on the risers for up to one and a half hours.
- All agreed that, when on the risers, the chorus is in "performance mode" as though performing for an audience. One chapter places chairs beside the risers to allow members, who cannot stand for long periods, the opportunity to sit down for a while yet maintain their contact with and performance mode with the rest of the chorus.
- Almost every chapter has had difficulty getting its members to sing in quartets (Another Editor's Note: another problem which we don't have in Strathroy. Way to go GUYS!). We did get some ideas for quartet activity which we have passed on to Bill Bowron, Quartet Activity Chairman, to surprise you with.

The whole session was geared to making your chapter an enjoyable place to sing, produce better Barbershop harmony, have fun and enjoy good fellowship. Being my first trip to COTS, I learned a lot about the chapter and it's operations, especially about the chapter meeting.

Focusing back to quartetting, I want to make a statement and give the members of the Strathrov Chapter a compliment. Every quartet that sings for the members present at a chapter meeting is given a heartfelt reception and hearty applause whether their performance is awesome, mediocre or someplace in between. It takes nerve to get up and sing in a quartet. we all have our own reasons why. In other words, every member of the chapter appreciates the effort that goes into every performance, knowing that the performance will improve the next time you perform. No one thinks any less of anyone else because of a performance error. I, for one, would like to thank all the members for their support of all levels of quartetting. I don't know if this is peculiar to our chapter or not. If it is HURRAY!



BARBERSHOP ON THE SILVER SCREEN

From the Internet - (spebsqsa.org/museum) - Initiated by Bud Jackson Final in a series of articles about Barbershop in motion pictures.

The Mainstreeters named themselves on route to the 1943 International Competition in Chicago. After closetting themselves in their rooms for serious rehearsal, the hard work paid off in their garnering of third place. They enjoyed great success over the next few years even performing on the Hey Rube radio show in Tulsa. They caught the ear of Roy Turner, Governor of Oklahoma during a club performance and it changed their career. Turner gave the quartet a complete makeover, became their manager and renamed them the Flying L Ranch Quartet. They kept most of their Mainstreeter repertoire but Turner wrote several songs about a subject dear to his heart, Hereford Cattle, and these were added to the repertoire and recorded as part of their four record album entitled Hereford Heaven. Backed by Turner they became prominent as representatives of the Hereford Heaven Association of Cattle Breeders and even as emissaries of the State of Oklahoma. In 1946, they made their first appearance in motion pictures singing one of Turner's songs in Home In Oklahoma which starred Roy Rogers. They hit it off so well that they ended up singing at Roy and Dale Evan's wedding. Later that year, they campaigned for and participated in inaugural events with Turner. They even made visits to other Governors as Turner's personal representatives. The quartet's greatest honor came in 1949 with the inauguration of President Truman. They sang at the pre-inaugural banquet and the following day rode on the Oklahoma State float in the inaugural parade. The quartet performed well into the 1950's across the southwest until it became too difficult to maintain day jobs and disbanding in the mid 50's. George McCaslin sang tenor, Harry Hall lead, Bill Palmer baritone and Fred Greaves bass.

Jumping ahead to the 80's, the classic basketball movie <u>Hoosiers</u> (1986), one of the editors favourite all-time inspirational films, featured the *Travelaires* singing the American National Anthem "The Star-Spangled Banner" before the start of a basketball game.


A One whole closet of your residence is devoted to the storage of all your barbershop costumes, accessories, music, etc.

If You have a box or satchel solely devoted to the purpose of toting all your "go to barbershop meetings" stuff.

A You have enough snapshots, posed contest pictures and show program momentos to fill more than enough scrapbooks to start a personal barbershop museum.

A Your children know the melody line to just about every song in your repertoire, and they could probably make a fair stab at most of the choreography, too.


