#### **How To Sing Cool Songs**

One problem quite a few of us are having is finding new songs to sing. The easiest way for most of us to sing these gems is by hearing other groups do them (like on quartet and chorus recordings). This works okay in some cases but could be disaster in other cases.

This is because many times we try to sing a song "just like the champs" (referred to as "Trying To Sing Like The Champs" syndrome), or we pick a song that is over our heads (referred to as ....oh never mind). I always try to keep in mind a very important rule of arranging and/or choosing songs - music does not exist on paper. What the heck does that mean? It means a great song is great because somebody sang it great. It also generally follows that somebody sang it great because they performed the song in a way that fit them the best.

So how does this help all of us non-champ barbershoppers? Well, since we're all obviously interested in music, we all have some kind of an ear and appreciation for it. We've all got a much better shot at being the best Joe Singer (not the guy who makes sewing machines) than we do trying to be the best Joe Connelly. I, therefore, submit the statement that anyone reading this has some ability to alter the interpretation (and sometimes arrangement) of a song to fit his own particular group the best.)

Going even farther with this, anyone reading this who can read or play through a barbershop arrangement of a song has the ability to develop his own performance plan. Are that all going to be great? Of course not.

However, part of this process is to realize this and step back and try to objectively evalutate what you've come up with. Does anything seem to stop the flow of the music (like a swipe held too long or a chord that doesn't tune)? Are there spots that sounded good by themselves but awkward when the whole song was performed? Does the song seem to constantly move forward? This is also the point where it's extremely useful to bring in a fifth ear (often called a dismembered body part, or sometimes a coach) to give

you this type of feedback.

The title of this had something to do with repertoire, but you'll notice I didn't list a bunch of songs to pick from. As I said above, a great song is great because somebody sang it great. The best way to pick great repertoire songs, then, is <u>not</u> to copy a song and performance of a song that brings out somebody else's strength, but rather to find songs and performance plans that <u>bring out your group's own strengths</u>. What should we call this concept. How about <u>creativity</u>. And the great thing is, everyone who has the love of music that most barbershoppers do has the ability to be creative.

#### JOHN'S JOTTINGS

I was just sitting at the piano fifteen before leaving for Barbershop. I can sing all parts with the help of the piano, so I can try to teach a new tag tonight. I can play the lead and sing the baritone, tenor and bass. I can play any note when I get stuck and can't figure out an interval. I can play all four parts on the piano and sing-along any part. I can do all this but I can't sing a tag until I get to Barbershop tonight because I need those three other guys who want to sing a tag to make it complete.

Thanks for coming out each and every night that you do. It simply wouldn't be the same without you!!



#### Team Work Pays Off


#### Ernie McEwen - Ticket Chairman

## The Ugly "r"

(Derbytown Gazette, Ed Crosley, Editor)

The most common and distressing fault in diction throughout the United States (and for that matter Canada too) is anticipation of the ending "r". It is the ugliest and roughest sound in the English language, similar to the growl of a dog. Southerners and many New Englanders avoid the harsh ending "r" hurdle by omitting it entirely, but this is not a satisfactory solution.

Anticipation of the "r" is not so objectionable in speech where the word or syllable in which it occurs is not sustained. In a song, however, where attempts are made to sustain it like a vowel, the sound is horrible to the sensitive ear.

One answer, to assist in singing the "r" when necessary, is to stay on the preceding vowel sound until the last possible moment, then lightly place the "r" at the end of the word by raising the tongue from the lower gum line. It will put the "r" in, but make it much more pleasing to the ear.


