After hours of practice and repetition we felt we were ready for our district competition. Our new vests were ready. Anticipation ran high. Unfortunately we drew last for the second year in a row. We shuddered - long hours in back rooms and endless waiting.



Some of us arrived Friday with the remainder arriving Saturday morning. The opportunity to attend the Joe Barbershopper session came up and several of us attended before we had to leave for our warm up and walk through on stage. After our walk through many of us returned to work with the mass chorus. What an experience! Dr. Greg Lyne was outstanding. The sound he drew out of the chorus was wonderful. Unfortunately our practice time made it impossible to sing with the Joe Barbershopper Chorus.

During our rehearsal session we were still correcting wrong notes, trying to get our pitch uniform for the first time and trying to sing in unison. It must be frustrating for our directors to keep repeating themselves and yet the errors keep occurring. However, we tried to do our best. Several of the ladies from Harold's Angels helped us with our make-up and we then sported our new vests. We looked good!

Most of us had the satisfaction of stating we felt better than last year. We sang our best.

When the results came out we were disappointed. 14th! Most of the fellows felt dejected. However, when we examined the marks, it was not as bad as it seemed. For our second song, Four Leaf Clover, One judge in the music category gave us a mark 18 points lower than the other judge in the category. If this mark had been better we could have placed as high as 10th or even 9th. Our presentation and singing marks were good and were better than higher placed finishers. The judging is very subjective and this years judges were not looking for the same things as last years judges. We were also not able to see the other choruses and therefore we do not know how we stacked up against them. When we saw the championship show Saturday night we could see why we were down so far, WOW! Greater Toronto was outstanding.

Even with all of this difference, I feel great that we made the effort and presented ourselves so well. We have to consider our purpose as a chorus. All of us had the opportunity to sing if we wanted to. We were not hand picked. We did not work on the same two songs for a year, in fact we learned eight other new songs. All of us have faults and strengths. As a group of people we enjoy what we are doing. We have fun singing. We must realize that unless you have a chorus of 70 or 80 to work with or unless you become very selective, you can never make it to the top. Therefore, we just sing, enjoy performing and singing and strive to make ourselves better and use both our audiences and judges at performances and competitions to become better at our hobby.

WE GET MORE E-MAIL

I was a member of the Joe Barbershop chorus at the Ontario District convention in Toronto on April 17, 1999. The chorus was rehearsed and directed by Dr. Greg Lyne. It was a fantastic experience - truly a highlight of my nine year barbershop career. I can't say enough about how good Greg Lyne is as a

teacher, a communicator, a musician, a director and a developer and inspirer of individual and ensemble talent. I believe everybody else who had the very good fortune of sharing that Joe Barbershop experience would say the same thing.

For many of us, the sound and music that was produced by that chorus at the end of that 90 minute session may have been as good as we have ever experienced as singers. And it was by a group with the collective talent (even with the few ringers we had) that you might expect to find in any large chorus in North America with, say, 75 or more singers.

My only question is: "Can it be bottled?" How can Greg Lyne's talent and genius be shared so that barbershoppers everywhere can experience what we "Joe Barbershoppers" did last Saturday in Toronto and so that what we were able to do in that chorus can be re-produced each time we sing in our own choruses across the District and the Society?

WE GET EVEN MORE E-MAIL

Peter, thanks for a great summation of your experiences with the Joe Barbershopper Chorus, which I believe fairly reflects the thoughts of all of us in that room. You asked an interesting question, "How can [Greg Lyne's talent and genius] be bottled?"

I have the greatest respect for Greg's talent and abilities, but I would submit that the real reason for success last weekend lies elsewhere. I believe that it was not Greg who challenged us last weekend, but we who challenged ourselves. And we rose to the challenge. Our chorus directors and music teams are asking us to make that challenge every week. We should ask ourselves, "Are we rising to that challenge?" and be honest with our answers.

The key ingredient last Saturday was that EVERY MAN in the room was focused, committed and united in trying to do his very best. I think Greg would be the first to admit that his, or any chorus director's, job is a lot easier when everyone in the chorus shares the same goal, is well prepared, and is just bursting with energy, paying strict attention to every word, and listening very hard to what's going on around him to fit his own voice into the unit sound. Unfortunately, at our weekly chapter meetings, we get complacent; or, worse, we lose faith that we can ever be better than we were 2 months, 2 weeks, or even 2 minutes ago, either individually or as a group.

Greg Lyne is a fantastic communicator, teacher, Barbershopper and person. But he is not unique, and the singers in the chapters he has worked with in the past, and currently, are not significantly better or worse singers, on average, than Ontario Barbershopper. What he does manage to do is to inspire those men to learn, grow, and develop the talents that they have, and to harness and drive that desire, week after week. THAT'S the message I'm taking from my experience with the Ontario Joe Barbershopper Chorus.

Sound Advice

- Know the words and notes so well that you concentrate on other techniques, craft and stage presence.
- Maintain correct volume control of your voice as indicated in the interpretation plan.
- 3. The higher you sing, the SOFTER you sing.
- 4. The lower you sing, the LOUDER you sing.
- 5. The lower you sing, the BRIGHTER you sing.
- 6. The higher you sing, the more COVERED you sing.

If you've thought, "Leave all that technical stuff to the director to figure out," then you've taken the first step to mediocrity. Take the pledge. Follow the six rules. Don't accept a mediocre performance. Make each rehearsal a little better than the last one. IT WORKS!


