"Can't Stop Singing" celebrates barbershop harmony at its finest.

Overcome with emotion, 1999 Champion REVIVAL in the moment of victory. A fascinating blend of performance, storytelling, and backstage romance, "Can't Stop Singing" is the story of barbershop harmony singers, people for whom songs about moon June, Mother, and the girl next door are part of the fabric of their lives. It's a celebration of the camaraderie that makes four men unabashedly cry at the joy of a beautifully sung love song, and the trust that melds them a performing unit as smooth as a baseball triple play combination.

Hosted by Nick Clooney, "Can't Stop Singing" a new performance documentary premiering on PBS stations across the country this August, is a revelatory, captivating look at barbershop of the '90s. Today's quartets are so much more than the straw-hatted, "Sweet Adeline"; singers of years past; these days, if you see a quartet in straw hats, it's likely part of a tongue-in-cheek comedy routine!

Can't Stop Singing goes behind the scenes at the 60th annual competition of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America (SPEBSQSA) in Atlanta to show the intense coaching and rehearsal that leads to a world-class stage performance of these amateur singers. Extensive interviews with the performers reveal the lives of quite ordinary people who, for one brief moment, become the best in the world at their chosen craft.

Like championship ballroom dancing or marching bands, the world of competitive barbershop harmony has developed a subculture of passionately devoted performers, fans, coaches and volunteers whose lives are swept up in their art form. "Can't Stop Singing" captures their passion by going backstage to trace the fortunes of several quartets pursuing the world championship. They include: from Albuquerque, Bank Street: Five-time medalists, veteran performers, with high qualifying marks entering the contest, have sung together for fifteen years. The group - two computer professionals, a manufacturer's representative, and a high school music teacher - finished fourth in the previous year's competition.

From Marietta, Georgia, just outside Atlanta, the comical FRED: Hometown favorites, FRED's members include a microwave engineer, an information systems manager, an architect, and an insurance agent, and came in second last year. Masters of slapstick, FRED is an audience favorite, but can a comedy quartet win the championship?

From Ohio, Turning Point: A hot young group making its first appearance in international competition, Turning Point qualified just three weeks after forming as a quartet. Its members include two music teachers, an executive recruiter, and a college freshman.

From Southern California, Revival: Revival has been to the international competition twice, but did not win a medal. This quartet -- which includes a music student, a businessman, an insurance executive, and a catalog editor -- are suddenly rising stars who are the buzz of the barbershop world with their impressive performances. In addition to the individual stories, the documentary reveals intense preparation the singers give to nuances of form, line, and motion; the roar of the appreciative crowd welcoming its favorite performers; the years of careful rehearsal culminating in a brief outpouring of passion and expression. This is the barbershop quartet singing of today, a story that is ultimately about love.

In the midst of all the aftermath, surrounded by hoopla, hugs and hurrahs, the distinction between old champions, new champions, and would-be champions seems less clear, and certainly less important. Clooney observes. "This is, after all, a brotherhood - a fiercely competitive yet loving brotherhood, united in song, single of purpose, dedicated to making the world a little happier, one song at a time."

"Can't Stop Singing": the Musical Heritage

"Can't Stop Singing" celebrates an American musical art form founded in the latter part of the 19th century, and enjoying a resurgence of vitality on the brink of the 21st century. It's called barbershop harmony, and it's one of the few musical forms considered uniquely American in its origins, along with jazz, the spiritual, and the cowboy song.

Barbershop harmony is a melting pot musical style, combining European hymn-singing tradition with African-American improvisational harmonies and chord progressions. First popularized in traveling minstrel shows and vaudeville, the style known as "barbershop" flourished during the 1890s-1920s, and was a staple of the earliest years of the recording industry.

The style today is practiced by more than 34,000 members of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America, Inc. (SPEBSQSA), and more than 70,000 adherents around the world.

Quartet singing is the core of the style, of course, and still considered the most prestigious segment of the hobby. But the vast majority of barbershop harmony singers perform in choruses, which range in size from a dozen to more than 150 men.

"Can't Stop Singing" explores the choral aspect of the hobby with rehearsal segments and interviews with top directors, and championship performances from four-time champions the Alexandria Harmonizers and eight-time champions The Vocal Majority.

Can't Stop Singing: the Musical Selections

There is music aplenty, of course, from the sweet, sentimental ballads that are the core of the barbershop style, to jazz-flavored, intricate arrangements showcasing the musical versatility of the top performers.

"Can't Stop Singing" features familiar songs from the heyday of Tin Pan Alley, to relatively new songs from the swing era and today.

An enduring facet of the barbershop style is a love of slapstick and G-Rated, family-oriented fun. Parodies, spoofs and good-natured send-ups of other performers enliven "Can't Stop Singing" with material new to general audiences, and loads of fun for them as they discover the barbershop world.



A hot young quartet that has qualified for the contest in its first try. Some very young singers in this quartet, representing the success of the barbershop society's efforts to bring the traditional style to a new generation of singers.

ALEXANDRIA HARMONIZERS-Alexandria, Virginia

Four-time world champion chorus

The Harmonizers are one of the oldest and most successful choruses in the barbershop world. This 150-man chorus is particularly noted for its interpretative lyricism, shown so brilliantly in "Wee Small Hours/Always Medley."

AMBASSADORS OF HARMONY-St. Charles,

Missouri

Directed by quartet champion singer Jim Henry, the Ambassadors are a young, aggressive, showy chorus with a flair for entertainment and a strong family bond.

THE VOCAL MAJORITY-Dallas, Texas


Eight-time world-champion chorus
