

# They Came To The Cabaret

By most of the tects that critics apply to such an event, our experiment with "Barbershop in a Cabaret setting" was a success

#### There Was Contrast

The elegance of the Sweet Adeline was nicely balance by the bolder and more direct presentation of the Vocal Federation. Each style has its distinctive subtlety. The audiences responses showed they appreciated the distinctiveness.

#### There Was An Attractive Ambience

While some of us may have had some misgivings about singing into the far reaches of a hall that once accommodated four sheets of ice in a curling rink, our fears were <u>not</u> well founded. Perhaps it was the comparatively low ceiling, but the acoustics were surprisingly good. Well modulated amplification provided a decided plus.

Besides, where else in the area cold we have found a site that provides room for a stage that comfortably accommodates fifty singers on risers, sufficient area for tables and chairs for 400 guests in a cabaret setting, an adequate dance floor in the center and a bar at each end? The selection of the site was a good one.

There Was A Receptive And Enthusiastic Audience I am sure all of the performers felt it. This audience came to be entertained and got what they came for. How many times were we asked, "When are you going to hold the next one?"

#### The Experiment Was An Economic Success

It was not possible to stage this kind of entertainment in the absence of certain economic risks. It was a new and different approach in our attempt to be innovative and happily it turned out to be a success if not a triumph.

Our Board of Directors is to be congratulated in their on going attempt to de-mistify barbershopping and restore it's original objective. Its music and style is, after all, indeed the "music of the people" and this cabaret was one of those nights that demonstrated that very thing. Just ask "the people".

Will there be another one? The decision is in the lap of the gods and the Board of Directors.

Special thanks to Bob Fennell, whose efforts, as usual, went far beyond the call of duty, and to Mr. Buck (I don't know his given name), whose D.J. selections provided a nice "nite cap" to an otherwise very satisfying evening.

Rural Roots is finally back rehearsing after having a very busy harvest and look forward to singing at the Vocal Federation's Annual Christmas Party.


