The winners of this year's tournament were Blake Hughes and Bill Gough. I'm looking forward to next year's event and one of these years I hope to make it into the second round of competition.



The Fall Convention is fast approaching. It will be held at the Sanderson Centre in Brantford Oct. 26-28, 2001

The following contests will be held: International Preliminary Chorus Contest (to select the chorus(es) to represent Ontario District in Portland in July 2002)

International Preliminary Seniors Quartet Contest (to select the Seniors Quartet to represent Ontario District at the Mid-Winter Convention in Riverside California in January 2002) Ontario District Quartet Contest Ontario District Novice Quartet Contest

The following choruses are eligible to enter the International

Preliminary Chorus Contest Toronto, Greater Toronto, Ottawa, Barrie, East York, Burlington, Brockville, Oshawa, Scarborough, Guelph, Newmarket, Seaforth, Kitchener-Waterloo, Sarnia, Oakville, and London.

All quartets who have not previously won the Ontario District Quartet Championship and contain no more than 2 members of a previous District Champion are eligible. Note that a quartet may consist of up to four past District champions but no more than two can have won from the same combination.

All quartets with at least two members who have never competed in a registered quartet are elegible for the Ontario Novice Quartet Championship. All quartets having all four members 55 years or older and where the sum of ages of the four members totals 240 are eligible for the International Preliminary Seniors Quartet competition. Quartets entering the Seniors competition may also enter the District Quartet Competition (subject to the eligibility rules for District Quartet Champion).

To enter the competitions, log onto the Society or District Web pages and go to the Contest & Judging page. From there you can click on entering the quartet or chorus competition. Complete the information and submit the form. By indicating you are entering an ONT contest, the form will be automatically forwarded to me. Upon receipt of the form, I will confirm back to you that you are entered. Starting in September I will send an updated list each week to the Ontario Mailing List of entries to date.
