Hi Guys!

Once in a while I like to put a note in the Fanfare related to anything and everything. I have been barbershopping for over 15 years and I have had a lot fun with everyone in our chapter meetings and performances. I would like to thank everyone for being themselves and bringing uniqueness to the chapter.

It is fantastic that the new members are ticking off the pole cat songs and some classics. I challenge some of the longer-time members to do the same. Get organized with learning tapes in your car or a mobile tape player that is completely portable. It makes learning songs fun and easy. Remember to listen many times before singing any notes and then when you sing, use the techniques we have been taught (support breathing, open back of throat and for leads and baritones, use "head tone" when in your upper range).

Thank you everyone for being "coachable". Did you know that the best singers in the world continue to coached. In our circles it is often called a fifth set of ears (coaches can make the same mistakes that they are trying to correct in a fellow singer (no one hears themselves the same as someone else).

Here's a challenge for someone in the Vocal Federation chorus. An afternoon group could have additional fun and many performances paid and otherwise. There is a real need for an afternoon group. Did you see in the Trillium that a songfest is planned for 2002 for seniors groups of any kind.

This could be like a district convention to attend except that there is no contest. Everyone performs for the fun of it.

This brings me to a topic on which I would like to reflect. Competition, I can take it or leave it, but I would like to sight some of the pros and cons. Competition does push us to do our very best but often at the expense of much hard work and a smaller repertoire. If the chorus or quartet does well compared to their expectations, the hard work is worth it because of the sense of accomplishment. For some, winning is where they want to eventually be, no matter how hard of how long it takes. For some, singing just for the fun of it, as long as it's not bad, suits them just fine. In our district and society, we have both kinds of chapters, and that's great that each can do what they need to be happy. However, most chapters are made up of members who have a lot of each kind of person, competitive and non-competitive.

I believe we need to have lot of respect for each other. The Society, District, Division and Chapter have ample opportunity for contest oriented members. I don't think there is nearly enough opportunity for the sing your best for fun only members. The seniors 55 years and over, now have an event for this each year. I would hope that more of these events could be held for all chapters and members. For example, the chapters could have a 2 song performance, by quartets once a year (not judged but evaluated).

The District could have one convention each year for competition and one for a songfest of all ages, choruses and quartets. Just as an aside, no one is going to sing for anyone, unless they give it their best shot so work and craft would be attended to along with no pressure from a judging panel and lots of raw fun.

Further, I wonder sometimes if retaining members has a lot to do with competition.



GOOD NEWS and DON'T WANNA HEAR NEWS

DON'T WANNA HEAR NEWS? Well we have to talk about it. Editor John had an article in the November's Fanfare about the Society Board's approval of an International dues increase of \$2.00 (from 70.00 to \$72.00) effective with December 31, 2001 renewals. Also approved were increases of a further \$4.00 for 2003, \$2.00 for 2004 and \$2.00 for 2005. I feel that these increases are minimal and reflect the rising costs of every service that the Chapter encounters.

On the other hand, my concern is with the increase in the exchange rate, pegged by the Society from the previous 1.5381 to 1.6031 for Canadian dollars. When we take International dues @ \$72.00 plus Ontario District dues @ \$29.26 for a total of \$101.26 U.S. dollars times the exchange rate, we send Kenosha \$162.32 for every registered member. This leaves our Chapter only \$37.68 out of your current \$200.00 dues.

At the Chapter's November Board meeting, it was the general opinion that our dues would have to increase to compensate for the increases from the Society. No motion was tabled at that meeting but I, as your treasurer, was asked to write this article so every member would know the facts. My personal recommendation at the January 2002 board meeting will be that we increase our dues by \$5.00 every year for 2002, 2003 and 2004. This would bring our chapter's revenue per registered member to \$42.68 for the year 2002. I trust that all members will understand and be harmonious in our hobby.

Now the good News!

The last January to March 2001 publication of the Ontario District "The Trillium" Volume 55-1, Chapter donations for 2001 to H4S were listed. Out of Ontario's 37 Chapters, we placed 24th with a per member contribution of \$64.32 each.

By my records for the 2001 year, we will be donating a total of \$2510.01/\$1722.51 to H4S and \$787.50 to Harmony Foundation. Fellows, this makes me proud as we have increased our per member contribution to \$69.72 each.

In case you didn't read that issue of "The Trillium", Ontario District chapters have donated in the past 24 years \$3,155,066.51 to the H4S cause.

At the Christmas party, **Harold's Angels** donated \$3000 from their fund raising to the Chapter for 2001. It is my understanding that this brings their total contribution to the Chapter to over \$20,000 for the past 6 years. Wow! What a job by the ladies. And by the way, they are pretty good singers as well!

During the past 10 years, SPEBSQSA leaders have been seriously examining the SPEBSQSA Charitable Mission and our relationship with Heartspring (formerly the Institute of Logopedics). In November 2000, the SPEBSQSA Board of Directors unanimously adopted a resolution declaring that, "it shall be the Charitable Mission of SPEBSQSA to preserve our musical legacy through support of vocal music education in our schools and communities." This change has created some confusion and we trust the facts presented in this document will help to educate the SPEBSQSA chapters and members on why the change had to be made.

- In 1949, The Institute of Logopedics was first brought to the attention of the SPEBSQSA leadership by the Wichita, Kansas Chapter. Logopedics was this chapter's local charity and, at that time, a speech correction center which treated hundreds of children. Logopedics had plans to create local clinics or field centers across the nation. That plan never materialized and today Logopedics has evolved into Heartspring, where Barbershoppers supported a residential school program with space for a maximum of 40 students.
- In 1964, when the Society adopted The Institute of Logopedics as its Unified Service Project, one of the major reasons was that, "music plays a major therapeutic role in communicating with patients." Today, Heartspring does not have a music therapy program. The Society has offered to help fund music research that could benefit thousands of children, but Heartspring has declined this offer.
- Logopedics was also selected as a Service Project so SPEBSQSA, "could play a major role and not be merely one of many supporting organizations." Today, Heartspring has the support of six other patron organizations, and operates at a substantial surplus.
- In 1964, few public schools were staffed and equipped to deal with multi-challenged students. In 1975, landmark legislation, the Education for All Handicapped Children Act passed by the United States Congress, made it mandatory that each school district in the country provides education for every student within its boundaries, regardless of physical or mental disabilities. This also allows Logopedics/Heartspring to obtain money from states and school districts for their residential students.
- During the past 37 years, Barbershoppers have contributed more than \$16 million dollars through Harmony Foundation to Logopedics/Heartspring. Additionally, Barbershoppers have helped Heartspring pay for a state-of-the-art \$14 million dollar campus, a \$4 million endowment fund, and the Shaklee Institute for research.
- With Barbershoppers' help, Heartspring is now operating with a surplus. In 1999 and 2000 combined, Heartspring reported \$4,292,441 of operational income over expenses. And, Heartspring reports 2000 total assets of \$25,173,957 and total liabilities of \$731,109, resulting in total net assets of \$24,442,848.



• For more than 10 years, SPEBSQSA leaders have been examining our Charitable Mission and evaluating the change in direction Heartspring has taken from the original intent of our relationship. This examination was conducted by the Society Board of Directors, the Society's Marketing Committee, a special task force in 1994, the Future 2001 Committee in 1995, and it culminated with the Charitable Mission Task Force recommendations in 2000. Throughout this process Heartspring officials were aware of the considerations and, indeed, commended the Society's move to make our Charitable Mission more focused on yocal music.

If SPEBSQSA was an organization just being formed today and was searching for a charitable cause that would be closely associated with our musical fraternity, the preceding facts would not point to Heartspring as they did to Logopedics nearly 40 years ago. SPEBSQSA leaders have now chosen to return to music as the major focus of our charitable mission. This, too, is based on many facts.

- Singing is disappearing from our culture. Choirs and choruses are shrinking in numbers or disappearing altogether. During the last several decades many schools have experienced funding challenges and school music programs have suffered cuts eliminating, or severely reducing the quantity and quality of music education.
- In the past three years alone Barbershoppers—individuals, quartets and chapters—have supported 42 grants totaling nearly \$250,000 to community and school music programs all over the U.S. and Canada. We estimate that nearly 10,000 people, mostly young people, have directly benefited from the grants, and more than 50,000 parents and audience members have indirectly been touched.
- Barbershoppers have also funded 15 Harmony Explosion Camps that have given over a thousand young men and their teachers a weekend of choral music and barbershop harmony education and fellowship.
- Vocal music has turned many young lives from destructive to positive endeavors. We
 have received letters and testimonials from students, parents and teachers thanking us
 for our help. We also know from nationally acclaimed studies that music builds
 mental and social skills in young people, and can also have therapeutic value.

Unfortunately, the leadership of Heartspring has recently chosen to try to divide our charitable efforts by soliciting direct donations from Barbershoppers and their chapters. This shocking and unauthorized attempt to divide the SPEBSQSA membership has forced the Society to direct Heartspring to cease and desist their solicitation of our members. Society support of Heartspring has always gone through Harmony Foundation, and Heartspring can continue to request future assistance directly from the Foundation, but not from our chapters and members.

Gentlemen, we hope you share these facts with your members and express the importance of this change. As we close one era, we open a new and exciting one. We have the opportunity to make a colossal difference in our culture. Please be a leader in this cause. Be vocal in your support and enthusiasm for the SPEBSQSA Charitable Mission and Harmony Foundation. Working together, we can help thousands **Sing...for life**.
