

# Comment Upon The New SPEBSQSA Charitable Mission

(Liberation is Coming).

All members of the Vocal Federation should be grateful to Les Campbell for contributing an article from the Society to Fanfare (Dec. Issue) which explained the new charitable mission of the Society.

I'm sure it revealed to most of us a number of facts that we had not previously heard of concerning the evolution of the Society's Harmony Foundation. We had been vaguely aware that Canadians annually make hefty donations to the Harmony Foundation. That money was channeled directly to Kenosha and that (in theory, at least), part of it would be "reinvested" in charitable works on the Canadian side of the border.

This, however, left hanging certain unanswered questions:

- a) What really happened to the money? I don't recall ever seeing an audit.
- b) If it was re-expended in Canada, where and on what was it spent? Certainly not in Strathroy.
- c) Where did Harmonize for Speech fit into the whole charitable picture?

Well the Society's article (contributed by Les) provided some of the answers.

It turns out the money from the Harmony Foundation went to "The Institute of Logopedics"! Whoever heard of it?

Thereafter (by a process described as evolution), it went to Heartspring". It also seems that Heartspring became a "loose cannon".! By a series of clever solicitations and some heavy lobbying of the U.S. Congress, Heartspring acquired a net worth of \$24,442,848 (That's U.S. dollars, friends).

Not content with this kind of success (and probably because Heartspring did not think that Harmony Foundation was generous enough), Heartspring began to directly solicit society members! It's no wonder that the Society's Board eventually became curious. They did the correct thing in reviewing its charitable mission and making some changes. The Society's article contributed by Les, discloses what

they have done. In my opinion, the new mission incidentally is probably not charitable in the legal sense.


Its principal target seems to be the schools; but education, both in Canada and the U.S. is publicly funded. Its source of revenue is the tax base and presumably, it is in no need of charity. Charity has been defined, by courts on both sides of the border, as the relief of poverty, the support of religion or the supply of aid and comfort to the handicapped and deprived.

But how does this change confer any benefits on Canadians and Canadian chapters? In search of an answer, I went to our Canadian representative of the Society's Board. (yes, we have one, and he has been active!). It turns out that this question of "What is in it for Canada?" has been recently rather warmly debated and more changes are in process of being made.

J. R.. "Digger" McDougall, of Ottawa, has been the Canadian representative on the Board of Trustees of Harmony Foundation. Mr. McDougall has been authorized to establish a Canadian Harmony Foundation, into which Canadian contributions shall be directed and out of which disbursements will be made exclusively in Canada. Presumably, the Board of this new organization will be exclusively Canadian. The new Foundation will cover all of Canada.

Our true charitable mission "Harmonize for Speech" was established by the Ontario District. It has always been administered by the District and it will continue to exist. One wonders how the money raised by Harmonize for Speech escaped the clutches of Heartspring" I suspect it was probably because they didn't know about it!

We should keep tract of developments to make sure that this promising beginning is followed up and becomes reality. Meanwhile, we all owe a warm thanks to Les Campbell, our treasurer, for contributing the article which raised the window and let in some air!
