
MOMENTS TO REMEMBER

Oh what fun, ha! ha! ha!, a so called freak spring ice storm caused, particularly when it comes on our annual show weekend I didn't have any reason to leave warm and comfortable surroundings Friday morning so I hadn't given much thought to what impact the storm was having. I knew the schools were closed but, so what. Anymore, it seems they either don't open or close down early even if the potential storm or fog conditions are somewhere off the B.C. coast.

I wasn't alarmed when Les Campbell called to let me know he had picked up the cube van from Tadgells at their request because they were closing on account of the mid morning power outage and didn't know if they would be open again during the weekend. It wasn't until I went out early in the afternoon that I realized the severity of the storm. There were downed tree limbs and large branches on the sidewalks and roadways, ice laden trees either bent to the extreme or uprooted and thickly ice coated electric and telephone wires stretched and sagging to the maximum from the weight of the ice. Some were already broken from falling branches, ice or wind.





Chapter Hero, Harold Boekhoven, powers up the 2003 Shows



As I drove, I realized the potential danger the ice coated tree branches overhanging the roadway presented and was intentionally driving from one side to the other to stay as clear as possible from this danger. Luckily I did, because as I drove along Adelaide Street a large branch broke free and fell on the road where I would have been driving under normal conditions. The car was heavily showered with flying pieces of ice but didn't damage it.

Returning home, I talked with Henry Wiersma, Principal, the Strathroy Community Christian School and learned there was a blackout at the school, the site of our Saturday shows. I then called Ray Pierce at Pierce Sound and Equipment to discuss the situation. Storm related delays had already pushed him behind schedule and he didn't expect to be at the school until 7:15/7:30 p.m., visa-vis our planned 6:00 p.m. setup time, and it was beginning to look like we could be in for a late night.

Ray confirmed that an 8:30 a.m. start Saturday would provide adequate time to setup for our matinee show if we decided to change from our Friday evening plans. I had further discussions with Les Campbell as well as Bob Fennell and decided to transport the stage scenery from Bob's and all the choral risers, chairs, podium, etc. from the Presbyterian Church storage to the school as soon as possible and while there was still daylight.



The lights finally come on for the Vocal Federation Chorus at about 2:20 p.m. Saturday April 5.

Les and Bob set about to organize this and I left for the school with three flashlights, cell phone, Ray's cell phone number, Chapter Directory members telephone numbers page, list of London radio station telephone numbers, tools and other items.

Once there, I was surprised and disappointed to find some plans and phone calls were being made with regards to finding another location. By this time, the possibility of having to cancel the shows had

crossed my mind different times and I had accepted the fact this might be necessary. Thousand of events have been canceled in the past because of weather conditions. However, changing locations had not occurred to me and it was not something I was now too receptive to do on very short notice. I felt that with numerous changes to be addressed it would be very onerous if not impossible to change locations and still do justice to all the theme related preparation specifically done to fit the school environment. Besides, there was no guarantee there could not be a blackout at another location.

Cancel and reschedule was a more appealing option for me and this also presented many hurdles to overcome, i.e. the school was reserved for next Saturday and unavailable unless the existing lessee would agree to change dates, Pierce Sound was also booked for the weekend but available Easter Saturday (not considered a good day from attendance point of view), Saturday, April 26th would conflict with the St. Thomas chapter annual shows, we didn't know the Crossfire quartet's upcoming schedule, etc., etc. Consequently, I wanted to stay the course.


When the scenery and other items from the church arrived we moved them by light from flashlights into the pitch-dark school auditorium and decided to leave all other setup plans until 8:30 a.m. Saturday.

Arriving at the school Saturday, things looked encouraging despite the fact full power had not been restored. There was insufficient power to operate the forty foot lighting truss system and sound system. However, there was enough power to light

two of the three sections of the ordinary auditorium lights and, given the circumstances, it would be satisfactory. Also, the auditorium acoustics are ample to permit doing without amplification and, lack of same would not be a show stopper even knowing beforehand it could be a real source for complaints from some of the audience. At this time, things seemed to be shaping up better for the show but, the situation was creating problems for our ladies auxiliary, the "Harold's Angels". There were, no kitchen lights, insufficient power to accommodate any appliances and the automatic starters on the gas stoves wouldn't work. I thought Henry Wiersma and Gord and Mary Vair might send all of us into orbit using matches to try and light the stoves, particularly the oven elements.

In the meantime, the stage scenery and auditorium setup up was progressing smoothly and everyone seemed optimistic that the Hydro One crews would have full power restored by about noontime, as per newspaper and radio reports and other so called reliable sources. As we now know, the opposite occurred and we were cast in darkness just when the stage lighting system was about to be raised to the ceiling joist. During this forced work stoppage I left to do a couple of errands and I used the opportunity to check three places for portable generators. None were available. I returned to the school hoping to find full or at least partial power had been restored but, that was not the case. We were in an indefinite blackout situation.

I was delighted when someone informed me that during my absence Harold Boekhoven. one of our newer members, had arrived at the school and he had a tractor p.t.o. driven portable generator that we could use. I found Harold and Ray discussing this and I became very excited when Harold told me the generator could produce enough power to operate both the light and sound systems. Harold volunteered to return home and drive the tractor with generator in tow back to the school, however, it was impossible to do this within the less than two hours remaining until our 2:00 p.m. matinee show start time. The generator could be transported by truck but there was no trailer readily available to move the tractor. Where can we get a tractor? No member living nearby had one. I knew from an early morning conversation with John Gough, the closest member with tractors, that he could not help because his were being used to operate power generators on his farm. Suddenly the light went on and I thought of Bruce Gripton, a London Chapter member and friend of many of our members, who lived within sight of the school. Knowing Les was a long time friend and seller of show tickets to Bruce. I had him telephone. Luckily Bruce was home and not only was the tractor ours, he would deliver it. With this news Harold and Roswell McPherson immediately left to bring back the generator and, as they say, the rest is history. Harold was able to hard wire the generator to the lights and sound system and our matinee show was underway less than thirty minutes behind schedule.

Our Harold's Angels ladies adopted the "just-intime" food delivery service, they gathered water from various sources and served a very delicious and piping hot dinner to cast members, their spouses, guests and friends between shows in the auditorium. Flashlights, candles, a portable

propane light and vehicle headlights were used to ensure the safety of our audience (fortunately there were no accidents) in other parts of the school and the parking lot. Of course, our evening show also was staged with the portable tractor/generator power system. It was quite comical to be part of and witness fellow chorus members putting on make-up and dressing in our finest tuxedo costume by candlelight and the light from vehicles parked outside the school classroom windows.


AFTERGLOW
