I've noticed that a few chapters in Ontario have "folded"in the past year or so. It appears that this has occurred as these chapters lost their music directors and were unable to find replacements. It seems clear that the role of music director is pivotal to the success and very survival of barbershop chapters. Naturally, the loss of a chapter results in a loss of members and the Society's decline in membership over the past 5 years is likely related to disappearing music directors and the resulting folding of chapters.

Hence, in my opinion, it behooves the Society to train and help insure a supply of music directors if barbershopping is to survive long term.



Village Ladies- Nov. 25th at Petrolia Playhouse (Eunice Fennell's choir). Tickets available in Sept.





Irving Berlin

He composed his own tunes and lyrics on a conventional piano where he used only the black keys. Throughout his career, he relied on an instrument called a transposing piano, which made it possible to change keys with the shift of a lever. After composing a tune, Berlin either sang or played it for an assistant, who would then transcribe it into musical notation. In that way, he produced a lifetime catalogue of some 1500 songs.

By the 1930's, Berlin was writing for Hollywood as well as Broadway. He wrote the scores for three Fred Astair and Ginger Roger movies, including Top Hat (1933), and the romantic Cheek To Cheek.

In his last years, he was the Howard Hughes of show business. He was worth tens of millions when he died. He refused to allow his music to be licensed for movies or commercials.

For six years, a group of fans gathered outside Berlin's home on his birthday and at Christmas to serenade him. On Christmas Eve 1983, as they were singing "White Christmas", the maid apparently invited everyone in for cocoa. Berlin hadn't made public appearance since his 80th birthday in 1968. He said it was his loveliest Christmas present ever and gave all the men a hug and all the women a kiss.

He was one of America's greatest songwriters, but at the same time he was as astonished as anyone that he was so successful. Underneath he was just Izzy Baline from the lower east side of New York City.
