

Village Ladies – Nov. 25th at Petrolia Playhouse (Eunice Fennell's choir). Tickets available in Sept.


The next meeting of Harold's Angels will be March 21st at Sylvia's.


- The second category should read: Bring guest to chapter meeting ---- 30 points (maximum 90 points for same quest).


